Goodman, 2013-10-01 Accountability, in the form of standardized test scores, is built into many government literacy policies, with severe consequences for schools and districts that fail to meet ever-increasing performance levels. The section on Marx will be longer than the sections on Durkheim and Mead. In part, the

length of the discussion of Marx's work is due to use of this section to begin introducing pertinent ideas of Durkheim and Mead.
